President's column

Fall is officially here... birds are migrating to warmer weather. I have seen several reports of a few rarities passing through. A Rufous Hummingbird, Dovekie, and a Red-Legged Honey Creeper. With that being said. An interesting tidbit to share is a weather radar can "see" much more than weather. Recently, a radar located near Merritt Island picked up an elongated echo. Which was the movement of some song birds migrating south. As, a result of this there was a large fallout. This means birds are taking a break to rest during severe weather.

One of my favorite things to do is to see how many different types of birds and butterflies we can spot in our yard. Even in fall, there are lots of different colors and shapes fluttering here and there.

Be a Little Wild this fall and Winter—leaving some of your yard wild and overgrown provides shelter, wild food sources, and puddling opportunities for birds and butterflies.

Start with Nectar Plants—Nectar plants are food for the birds. Especially the hummingbirds and butterflies. Pentas, salvia, firecracker, firebush... there are so many to choose from.

A few things to share with everyone.






Field Trip to Appleton Museum of Art

My favorite object in the museum was a little sculpture of a dachshund. Pure whimsy.





December 1-5, 2022

The seventh annual **NORTH SHORE BIRDING FESTIVAL**, sponsored by Orange Audubon Society (OAS), hosts 70 trips—Thursday morning, December 1st through Monday, December 5th—on the Lake Apopka North Shore and other Central Florida birding hotspots.

For out-of-town participants:

- The festival uses the Youth Camp at beautiful Wekiwa Springs State Park for catered keynote dinners and evening owl and
 woodcock walks on Friday and Saturday evenings. If you WILL participate in these evening events, we recommend you book
 a place to stay in the Apopka area. In the next day or two, the Hampton Inn and Suites Orlando/Apopka, will be giving us a link
 for you to book using our festival group rate.
- If you are sure you WON'T be participating in the evening events, we recommend you book a place to stay on the Lake County side of the North Shore, closer to the McDonald Canal area. Unfortunately, the same weekend are events in Clermont and Mount Dora, so no hotels really close would give us a group rate. But we have secured a group rate at the Microtel in Leesburg, not too far.
